'Taking hold' and 'losing grip' of Bureaucratic Literacies: Insights from The Philippines.

This seminar led by **Christopher Millora** of the University of East Anglia will consider how volunteering, especially in resource-poor contexts, may be a pathway for participation in development processes. Volunteer organisations increasingly need to collaborate with a wider network of bureaucratic institutions that demand rapid, quantifiable results and evidence of value for money.

How do these bureaucratic processes influence volunteers' experiences and learning? Drawing on an 11-month ethnography with a youth organisation on HIV/AIDS awareness and an informal settlers' association in the Philippines, this seminar will explore literacy practices and strategies that volunteers employed to make sense of and engage with ('take hold of') bureaucratic processes and texts. I will also discuss how the failure to do so ('losing grip') may lead to suspicion, resistance and ultimately non-participation, thus highlighting how literacy practices may construct and/or intensify inequalities within the community.

I will then pose critical questions. To what extent do external institutional practices structure internal ones? What may be the 'divisive' tendencies of literacies? How can organisations best support volunteers as they navigate 'new' literacies?

Christopher Millora is a PhD researcher with the UNESCO Chair in Adult Literacy and Learning for Social Transformation at the School of Education and Lifelong Learning, University of East Anglia. He researches the participation of 'marginalised' communities through volunteering and social activism, and how such processes cultivate or confine members' learning processes and personal transformation. He holds a joint MA in Lifelong Learning Policy and Management from the Danish School of Education and UCL Institute of Education.
